


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The Romero Child Charter

An Introduction

Within the Romero family our vision is to be a Beacon of Excellence for Catholic Education that serves students from the age 3-19 years. Our aim is to provide an innovative yet academically rigorous curriculum that inspires, empowers and enables all our students to recognise their full potential and respond to what God calls them to be. We partner and support parents in their role as primary educators and aim to create a welcoming, compassionate, diverse and vibrant community that develops within our students a greater global awareness and encourages both their academic and spiritual growth.

It is therefore a great pleasure to introduce this document which sets out our Romero Child Charter. This Charter provides details of the experiences that all children will have the opportunity to participate in whilst at a school within the Romero Catholic Academy. Our children, join us as Nursery children in one of our 7 primary schools and begin a 15-year journey which culminates in them leaving Year 13 at Cardinal Wiseman after completing their Secondary education. The Romero Child Charter describes this journey, it provides a pathway that aims to develop the whole character of our students, with Jesus as our model of faithful living, readying them for their future lives as they prepare to take their place in the adult world.

There are six strands to the Romero Child Charter and within each strand the experiences build sequentially on those that have gone before. This means that there is a seamless transition between each stage of education. So, whether a child is progressing from our Early Years provision to Key Stage One, or from our primary education to secondary education at Cardinal Wiseman, we – as an Academy – have a clear vision of how we can further develop their character to prepare our children for the opportunities, responsibilities, and experiences of later life.

The premise is simple, by providing our students with a vast range of experiences that are deeply rooted in faith which allow them chance to explore the world around them in all its wonder, we prepare our children to be all that God intended them to be and assist them in maximising their contribution to the wider world.

We recognise that every child is joyfully unique and equipped with special gifts, given to them by the grace of God. Each strand of the Romero Child Charter aims to encourage children, throughout all aspects of school life and beyond, to explore and nurture these gifts and use these to serve others for the common good. In doing so they will understand and further develop their relationship with God; and both discover and appreciate the reasons as to why they were brought into the world. They will understand how they have been:

ROMERO REFLECTS PRAYER & CHAPLAINCY

As a provider of Catholic Education, we play a key role in the faith formation of every child. We strive for all of our pupils learn to see the face of Christ in everyone. Romero Serves provides opportunities for all of our pupils to develop compassion, so that they are able to recognise and support those in need. Social Action and Social Justice feature heavily within this strand, which is anchored by the quotes of our Patron, Saint Oscar Romero. Pupils emulate our patron by actively making a positive contribution to society, as well as developing two key dispositions: empathy (the capacity to stand in the shoes of another) and solidarity (the capacity to walk with another).

We understand that Active experiences can have a considerably beneficial impact of the learning and development of our Pupils. 

Early Years

- 1. Link with a prayer partner
- 2. Share a prayer bag at home to make a holy place
- 3. Attend a Family Workshop
- 4. Learn about a festival
- 5. Participate in a performance
- 6. Get to know their Parish Priest and Church

Key Stage One

- 1. Plan and lead a collective worship to members of their own class or with members of their family
- 2. Participate in a whole school mass
- 3. Appreciate different faiths
- 4. Participate in a whole school retreat and use all parts of the Church with reverence
- 5. Perform in a Nativity or Easter play
- 6. Participate in a class assembly





- 4. Stand in silence to remember loss, service and sacrifice
- 5. Through action and prayer, remember & understand the human sacrifice as a result of conflict and war
- 6. Actively contribute or lead in the distribution of resources to others
- 7. Call for action communicate with local councillor, MP or other relevant standing member, to raise awareness of an issue
- 8. Encourage their peers or our primary students to sacrifice as part of Lenten almsgiving
- 9. Visit a place that provokes human conscience






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Key Stage Three

- 5. Experience mindfulness through PSHE; improve mental and social wellbeing
- 6. Support sports days or competitions or extra curricular activities
- 7. In tutor groups, contribute ideas for a healthy menu through the Catering service for either Primary or Secondary; or plan a healthy meal for an event such as Christmas
- 8. Participate in the Duke of Edinburgh award




